

FOREWORD



As part of its mission to promote a better understanding of the meaning and message of the Qur'ān among the English-speaking people, the Islamic Foundation takes pride in publishing this work. Written by an eminent contemporary Muslim activist and thinker, Irfan Ahmad Khan, it will help readers appreciate better the eternal Divine guidance offered by the Qur'ān. Over the years Professor Khan has been engaged, mostly in the US, in Da'wah and interfaith work bringing the various faith groups together on many common issues. During the course of his interaction with both Muslims and non-Muslims he realized the need for presenting the message of the Qur'ān in an idiom best suited for them. His elucidation of the Qur'ān has been enriched by his deep study of philosophy, both Islamic and Western varieties.

Although the present work focuses on *Sūrah al-Baqarah* in terms of studying the import of its each and every verse and key terms, it succeeds remarkably in projecting the entire Qur'ānic worldview. Reading this work one thus gains a fairly clear idea of the quintessence of the whole Qur'ān, particularly of *tawḥīd*, the Hereafter (*Ākhirah*) and Messengership (*Risālah*). This is illustrated best by his masterly and extensive exposition of the two salient verses *Āyah al-Birr* and *Āyah al-Kursī* (verses 177 and 255-257 of *Sūrah al-Baqarah* respectively). While bringing out their meaning in full, the author provides an abundance of cross references to and paraphrasing of other relevant Qur'ānic verses, as a result of which the readers become familiar with the overall, broader framework of the entire Islamic worldview.

IRFAN AHMAD KHAN (b.1931) in India, graduated in Islamic Sciences and Classical Arabic from Rampur and received his M.A. in Philosophy from AMU (1958) where he taught Western Philosophy, and Theology (1958 – 1973). In 1974, he moved to USA, where he obtained Ph.D. in Philosophy from University of Illinois at Chicago and taught Western and Islamic Philosophy at various institutions in USA. During the last fifty years Dr. Khan's reflections upon Qur'anic ayat continued with his own involvement with the problems of the humanity and the Ummah. And mainly during the last thirty years he has been working with the graduates of the Western universities in developing a methodology of understanding the Qur'an.
