Since open polemics began between China and the Soviet Union at the time of the Test-Ban Treaty in July 1963, an unprecedented and daunting weight of verbiage has been produced by both sides. Much of it is repetitious and long-winded, but it also includes a significant quantity of valuable information or comment upon the origins and development of the Sino-Soviet dispute.

The purpose of this documentary survey is to extract and interpret this information in a form to which easy reference can be made, and to provide a chronological account, supported by the words of the participants themselves, of the most important issues and events of the Sino-Soviet dispute. An introductory essay places the dispute in historical perspective.

A total of 138 extracts from Soviet and Chinese documents published in the period 1963-67 is presented in this collection. An additional 23 documents from the earlier period of 1950-62 are also included *in extenso* as appendices. The extracts are arranged in thirty sections, which range from relations between the Soviet Union and the Chinese Communist Party during the Chinese revolution to Sino-Soviet differences over the Cultural Revolution.

Each section is preceded by an editorial commentary, which provides the essential background and summarizes the available information on the events and issues referred to in the documents.

Important documentary evidence is provided on such crucial questions as the Sino-Soviet Alliance of 1950, the Korean War, the Soviet Party's 20th Congress, Mao Tse-tung's Moscow speech of November 1957, the Great Leap Forward, nuclear weapons and defence, Sino-Soviet economic relations, the Moscow Conference of 1960, Sino-Soviet border incidents, the Sino-Indian war of 1962.
