

## Bulgarian Muslims under the hammer

"Every new day brings with it the tragic news of further killings of our brothers by the Bulgarian police... In Mestanli, they killed 80 Muslim Turks... I don't know how long I can avoid the Bulgarian police..." ### Ideas that led to the gallows

The execution in the Sudanese capital Khartoum of Mahmoud Muhammad Taha, leader of the Republican Brothers (formerly the Republican Party), on charges of opposing Shariah has focused attention on the man and his ideas and fuelled debate as to whether his actions constituted an act of "war on the Muslim community," as his accusers charged. Arabia profiles the man and his ideas and evaluates the case for and against him. The arguments are not, however, about whether his ideas — which stand condemned by any standard for their anti-Islamic character — are acceptable, but on whether he should have died for holding such opinions. The scourge of the Sungusungu

"Egalitarian socialist" Tanzania is predominantly Muslim, yet Islam is under constant government attack. First came a short-lived "Christian militia," now the Nyerere regime uses the excuse of secularism — but the latest alarming development is the encouragement of the "Sungusungu." This pagan gang of thugs, ostensibly set up to suppress cattle stealing, is being supplied with government firearms and is used as the strong arm of authority to curb restive inhabitants as well as to attack Muslims.
